

A few weeks ago, the State Premier announced the government's decision to reject Glencore's proposal to pump carbon dioxide

into the Great Artesian Basin (GAB). When Murweh Shire Council first called for a halt to this trial last year, every council throughout Queensland unanimously backed the call.

Within weeks, numerous regional organisations and independent groups joined the call to stop, presenting a united front to the State government. It was truly heartening to see such widespread cooperation.

Common sense prevailed, and the State Government stopped the GAB proposal in its tracks. This is a significant victory for all 80 local communities that depend on the GAB, including ours. The GAB should never be used as a dumping ground.

It's the lifeline for many people, essential for living, and crucial for Queensland's economy. It's simply not something to mess with.

While this latest announcement from the Queensland State Government is a big step forward, there is more to the story. The State government has acknowledged this precious resource with money in this year's State Budget for a Security Program for the GAB. The GAB spans three states and the NT, making it a federal government issue. Rest assured, Murweh Shire was there at the start and will continue to stand firm until this vital resource is fully protected for future generations.




# THE OUTBACK MASTERS JUNIOR CLINIC

# Making history

# Historic House Museum was named as a 2024 Tourism and Events Queensland "Best of Queensland Experience"

**ON JUNE 25, 1973,** a meeting to form a historical society was held at Corones Hotel with the aim of preserving the heritage and history of Charleville and the district. This was four days before tenders closed for the purchase of the old National Bank building in Alfred Street.

Almost a year later, on the 25th of March 1974, this wonderful building was officially signed over to the society and, only a month later, on April 22, 1974, the very first meeting of the society took place in this iconic building.

This inaugural meeting of the Charleville and District Historical Society began a journey that continues today—a journey that

seeks to preserve and enhance the history of Charleville and the Murweh Shire, centred around the iconic Historic House Museum.


Fifty years on, this milestone was recently celebrated as Charleville's first National Bank, established in 1887, opened its doors to tourists and locals alike for an unforgettable Open Day featuring static displays, working steam machinery and the ultimate pioneering experience—discovering Charleville on Historic House Museum's fully restored 1924 International Bus.

That evening, as the dusk of an outback sky settled, invited guests met on the lawn of the Museum to celebrate that initial meeting and dwell on the achievements of the subsequent

committee members whose passion and dedication has led to Historic House Museum being named as a 2024 Tourism and Events Queensland "Best of Queensland Experience".

The current Charleville and District
Historical Society committee were joined
by special guests including previous
members, local business owners, Murweh
Shire Councillors and the Murweh Shire
Mayor, Shaun "Zoro" Radnedge as the
Society President, Robert Eckel, paid
tribute to the work so many have done to
make Historic House Museum the attraction
it is today. Charleville's Historic House
Museum – keeping our history alive long into
the future.









### How local government united to protect the Great Artesian Basin

### IN A WIN FOR MANY REGIONAL COMMUNITIES,

the Miles State Government recently took decisive action to not only stop mining giant Glencore's plan to pump waste carbon dioxide (CO²) into the underground Great Artesian Basin (GAB), but in this year's State Budget allocated \$32 million over the next four years to a GAB security program.

Last year, at the 2023 National General Assembly of Local Government (NGA) in Canberra, Murweh Shire Council, with the unanimous backing of every Queensland council, called on the Australian Government to immediately stop a subsidiary of coal-mining giant Glencore from injecting its waste CO<sup>2</sup> captured from Millmerran Power Station into the GAB, Australia's largest groundwater basin and water source for millions of Australians.

At the time, The Mayor Murweh Shire, Shaun (Zoro) Radnedge was forthright about the trial. "It's madness," he said at the Australian Council of Local Government (ACLG). "Most of Queensland depends upon this basin, one way or another, and we're letting a coal mine pump its waste into our water."

Over the following months, the movement to stop the proposal found support, with calls growing louder from the regions. The Western Alliance of Councils, South West Queensland Regional Organisation of Councils, every Mayor in Queensland, the Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ), Queensland Farmers Federation, AgForce, and countless individuals joined in the chorus to bring this to the State Government's attention.

Ultimately, the Department of Environmental Services and Innovation (DESI) quashed it at the end of May, deeming that Glencore's application was unsuitable to proceed due to its potential impacts on groundwater resources.

When Premier Steven Miles made the announcement, he was handed a bottle of water taken from the GAB by Mayor Radnedge. The premier lifted the bottle and chugged back the crystal-clear water without hesitation.

After the announcement, Mayor Radnedghe expressed his gratitude to the Premier and said, "This kind of



action should never be permitted. Most of Queensland depends on this basin somehow and we can't let this happen in the future."

In this year's State Budget, the GAB Water Security Program was allocated \$32 million over four years, subject to matching Australian Government funding to cap free flowing bores. This will add to the more than \$89 million the Queensland Government has already invested to protect the GAB. Since work began to improve the GAB, more than 226,000 megalitres a year has been returned to the basin.

The Great Artesian Basin supports around 80 communities, including Murweh, in outback Queensland and is essential to agriculture, industry and the environment.

To help border communities in New South Wales and Queensland, the Miles Government is establishing a Cross-Border Commissioner. This new role will help manage cross-border issues and work collaboratively with NSW on service delivery matters and to pursue economic opportunities.

"I would like to thank the other councils for joining us in this effort and for the tremendous support we received from the LGAQ, QFF, and AgForce, who have been instrumental in getting this issue in front of the right people," said Mayor Radnedge. "We must protect our water supply," concluded Mayor Radnedge.

# Survey About Communications

# Help the Community Stay Informed

**MURWEH SHIRE COUNCIL** has teamed up with The University of Southern Queensland to improve its communication with the community during major events, including events like the floods earlier this year.

According to Mayor Shaun 'Zoro' Radnedge, "We have recently had several different disasters within our community, including Christmas Day storms, power outages, and the recent flood event, and it has once again highlighted one of the Murweh Shire's main objectives, which is to keep the community safe and informed."

Dr. Ashley Jones of the University of Southern Queensland reminds us that, "we always need to review our processes and know how people are communicating. We have so many different tools available to us today. It is not just one but many ways we connect."

With the recent floods affecting the community, this is a good time to check in and learn how to improve our current communication methods.

"Whether it's the day-to-day business of Council, community events in towns, or alerts that the community needs to be made aware of, we want to understand how residents would like this information shared, and this survey is an opportunity for the community to have their say," Mayor Shaun 'Zoro' Radnedge said.

Dr. Jones states that the data will inform

future communication methods during major events, like the flood, and future plans for general communication within the community.

"We need as many people as possible to complete the short, anonymous online survey. It will take a few minutes to complete," Dr Jones said.

Dr. Jones further explains, "There is a section for those who belong to community groups and take the lead in one or more groups. This is aimed at finding out what groups use to communicate."

We currently share information through various media services and social media platforms, and it's important to know what residents are currently utilising today to source their information during major events so we can update our current communication tactics.

Residents are encouraged to scan the QR code and anonymously complete the short survey. The link will also be shared across all

Council social media platforms for those who cannot access QR codes.
