


A family-friendly interactive performance

All scalps accepted by the Council must be dried and delivered to a Council depot.

Are you eligible for the two-percent deposit Queensland Housing Finance Loan Regional trial?

The Queensland Government is helping more Queenslanders living in country areas to become homeowners so they can stay close to their families, jobs, and community connections. The **Queensland Housing Finance** Loan is for people who can afford to buy or build a home but cannot get a loan through a bank or building society. The Queensland Government has extended the household income eligibility of the existing Queensland Housing Finance Loan from \$141,000 to \$201,000 per annum for a twoyear trial, allowing more people in regional Queensland to apply for the loan. This trial is open to eligible people living in 45 councils across Queensland and includes Murweh.

The loan offers a variable or fixed interest rate, a minimum deposit of 2% of the purchase price, or the difference between the maximum loan you're eligible for and the property's purchase price with no monthly account-keeping fees or lenders mortgage insurance. To learn more about eligibility:







Kate Scott, LifeFlight's Regional Advisory Committee Chair, South West Region, congratulated the community on hosting an outstanding fundraiser. "The South West LifeFlight helicopter and crew service the Morven area, and it was so wonderful to connect with this generous community," she said.

Mayor Shaun "Zoro" Radnedge said the Ball's success was testimony to the community's supportive spirit. "Murweh is a very close-knit community, and events like this Ball showcase the heart and soul of our residents. BORN AND RAISED in Western



FROM CHARLEVILLE TO VIETNAM

NEV O'CONNOR'S STORY IS A remarkable and a fitting addition to Charleville's rich and storied military history. Nev's parents came from Adavale, moved to Charleville and built a house in 1938 in Watson St. Nev was the eldest of eight children, and all but two received a tertiary education, something Nev proudly recounts of his parents.

Nev started early schooling in Charleville but attended high school at Nudgee College in Brisbane, where he earned himself a scholarship to the University of Queensland to study medicine.

During his fifth and sixth years of medical school, he received an army scholarship, which provided him with a much-needed wage and committed him to four years of military service in the Australian Army, just as the Vietnam War began in earnest.

His time in Vietnam started in January 1968 and lasted until January 1969, arriving during what became known as the Tet Offensive, a massive, coordinated series of enemy attacks against the US and its allies that started on January 30, 1968. Upon landing, he found himself in the thick of it.

"It was quite an introduction to Vietnam. I was in the middle of it," says Nev. In August of that same year, Nev found himself in the battles of Coral and Balmoral, a brutal three-week conflict around two fire-support bases called Coral and Balmoral that commenced with a vicious fire-fight and bombardment at 3.30 am on the first night.

"I arrived the next morning," said Nev. "Another doctor had been there but left when Nev arrived, leaving him as the only doctor. Nev stayed for a month. After the Seventh Battalion returned home, Nev was transferred to the 8th Field Ambulance, under the command of legendary physician and soldier Major General Brian "Digger" James, recipient of the military cross, MBE, and Order of Australia.

As the only doctor in his Battalion, Nev was responsible for 700 soldiers, treating numerous injuries, a host of tropical diseases, accidents and shootings.

When the doctor from the 3rd Battalion was injured, Nev filled in for three weeks before returning to the 8th Field Ambulance at Nui Dat.

Upon returning home, Nev was stationed at Puckapunyal. With his term in the Army ending, he was offered and accepted a two-year posting in Singapore. Nev and his family moved to Singapore, where he worked with the British medical staff at RAF Changi Hospital for 18 months.

While in Singapore, Nev took a keen interest in psychiatry, handling the psychiatric cases in the absence of a resident psychiatrist at Changi, unknowingly preparing him for the rest of his life's work back in Australia.

After two years in Singapore, Nev left the Army in 1973 and began to practice general medicine. One day, he bumped into his former professor of psychiatry, who offered him a job in psychiatry, a field he'd fallen in love with in Singapore. Nev accepted the position of psychiatry registrar at Lowson House at Royal Brisbane Hospital, for a year. Afterward, he worked as a psychiatrist in Toowoomba until his retirement. Now 85, Nev resides in Toowoomba.

Wynnum Fringe and Murweh Shire Partner to Relocate and Restore Historic Spiegeltent

IN A PARTNERSHIP WITH MURWEH

SHIRE, Wynnum Fringe plans to relocate the Augathella Spiegeltent —Dutch for mirror tent—to Wynnum, Brisbane's bayside suburb, and give it a new lease on life.

Wynnum Fringe is on a mission to rescue, reimagine, and revive the Augathella Spiegeltent, a unique cultural asset with a rich history. Initially known as the Q150 Shed, this historic tent was designed by the renowned Belgian Spiegeltent masters, the Klessens, and constructed in Brisbane. It was commissioned for Queensland's 150th anniversary celebrations in 2008 and toured across the State before settling in Augathella and serving as a community function and entertainment centre. However, it has lain dormant since 2013, gradually falling into disrepair.

The relocation is the brainchild of Tom Oliver, founder of the Wynnum Fringe. "It revitalises a forgotten gem in Queensland's cultural history and gives the Brisbane region a new live performance venue," Mr Oliver said. The project aimed to raise \$500,000 through a groundbreaking community crowdfund. The community's response was overwhelming, with \$100,000 raised in just three weeks. Mr Oliver said that Wynnum Fringe has been creating shows and experiences in similar Spiegeltents for the past three years and now we have an opportunity to create an engine room of our own for Queensland-made product to get up and ready to tour the world. In late 2023, Mayor Zorro of Murweh Shire Council and Tom agreed that Wynnum Fringe would acquire this piece of history from the town, rename it 'The Augathella', and celebrate the regional QLD town wherever it plays in the world.


Wynnum Fringe has grown to become one of Australia's most vital annual festivals, not only for its cultural significance but also for its economic impact. It employs more than 2,500 creative workers, champions local artists, welcomes over 100,000 visitors and injects more than \$3 million into the local economy. Cr Shaun Radnedge, Mayor of Murweh Shire Council, enthusiastically endorsed the ambitious crowdfunding project. "We are extremely proud to partner with Wynnum Fringe to revitalise and restore this great asset, honour Queensland's history, and immortalise one of our great regional towns," said Cr Radnedge.

The project aims enough to cover the costs of relocation and extensive renovations. These include essential repairs like replacing rotting floors, fixing leaky windows, repairing UV-damaged roofs, and enhancements such as stained glass installation and interior finishings.

All donations over \$2 are fully taxdeductible, and both corporations and community members are invited to support this vital initiative.

Fittingly, the Shire recognised the week with a flurry of events. Saturday started the festivities with a netball carnival at the Charleville netball courts, followed by the official opening ceremony at Charleville State High School on Monday. Tuesday saw the Charleville Hospital Morning Tea at the new Community Allied Health Building on the Hospital grounds. On Wednesday, a three-on-three basketball competition was held at the high school hall. Basketball was followed by QPS & Healthy Ageing morning tea. On Thursday, the Waroona Multipurpose Centre held a lovely BBQ lunch, followed by a CWAATSICH & Drug Arm Trivia Night at the RSL. Volunteers conducted workshops on traditional yoga and boomerang throwing at both primary schools.

The highlight came on Friday, with the Community March commencing at Council Chambers, followed by formalities at St Mary's School and the mayor judging a RESQ Art Competition. After the march, there was a cake-cutting ceremony with elders.

The mayor said the week was a huge success and added that the Shire should look to the future regarding reconciliation. "Let's see a future where our children and grandchildren grow up in a community that values diversity, inclusivity, and respect for all cultures. A future where the contributions of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples are acknowledged and celebrated and where their voices are heard and respected."









Survey About Communications Help the Community Stay Informed

MURWEH SHIRE COUNCIL has teamed up with The University of Southern Queensland to improve its communication with the community during major events, including events like the recent floods.

According to Mayor Shaun 'Zoro' Radnedge, "We have recently had several different disasters within our community, including Christmas Day storms, power outages, and the recent flood event, and it has once again highlighted one of the Murweh Shire's main objectives, which is to keep the community safe and informed."

Dr. Ashley Jones of the University of Southern Queensland reminds us that, "we always need to review our processes and know how people are communicating. We have so many different tools available to us today. It is not just one but many ways we connect."

With the recent floods affecting the community, this is a good time to check in and learn how to improve our current communication methods.

"Whether it's the day-to-day business of Council, community events in towns, or alerts that the community needs to be made aware of, we want to understand how residents would like this information shared, and this survey is an opportunity for the community to have their say," Mayor Shaun 'Zoro' Radnedge said.

Dr. Jones states that the data will inform

future communication methods during major events, like the flood, and future plans for general communication within the community.

"We need as many people as possible to complete the short, anonymous online survey. It will take a few minutes to complete," Dr Jones said.

Dr. Jones further explains, "There is a section for those who belong to community groups and take the lead in one or more groups. This is aimed at finding out what groups use to communicate."

We currently share information through various media services and social media platforms, and it's important to know what residents are currently utilising today to source their information during major events so we can update our current communication tactics.

Residents are encouraged to scan the QR code and anonymously complete the short survey. The link will also be shared across all

Council social media platforms for those who cannot access QR codes.












