




Council Elections

The 2024 local government elections will include elections for mayors and councillors in each of Queensland's 77 councils. Election day will be on Saturday, 16 March 2024. Notice of election will be made on Monday 29 January and candidate nominations open the same day. Candidate nominations close on Tuesday 12pm 13 February 2024. Details of dates, times and locations will be available on the ECQ website during the election.

The "Turf Oval Bridge" over the levee diversion in Alfred Street was named as a result of a competition held in Charleville to name the bridge. Undoubtedly a few of the older locals will reminisce about their prowess on the cricket field when matches were played there, or the goals they scored in junior soccer. The diversion banks are now covering the oval.

BATTERIES **CAUSE 93 FIRES THIS YEAR**

Rechargeable lithium-ion batteries (RLIB) are everywhere: power-tools, phones, laptops, e-bikes, vacuum cleaners and lots of children's toys, and can be recognised with any of these symbols: lithium-ion', 'Li-ion', 'li-po', 'lithium-polymer' or 'Li+'. When they are overcharged, damaged, left in the sun or charged inappropriately, they can catch fire or, in extreme cases, explode. If that's not bad enough, when overheated or on fire, li-ion batteries can create a highly toxic vapour cloud are difficult to put out with water or a fire extinguisher. Even if you do, re-ignition is likely to happen even if the fire seems to be extinguished.

This year alone, Queensland Fire and Emergency Services - QFES recorded 93 fires that were reported to being attributed to rechargeable lithium-ion battery (RLIB) devices. Understand the associated risks visit www.qfes.qld.gov.au/lithium-ion for more information



The Great Artesian **Basin Protest Grows** Louder

Back in July at the National General Assembly of Local Government in Canberra, Murweh Shire, as a part of Southwest Queensland Regional Organisation of Councils (SWROC), called on the Federal and State governments for more information into the proposed the Carbon Transport and Storage Corporation (CTSCo) potentially injecting up to 110,000 tonnes of CO² per year into the Great Artesian Basin (GAB). Murweh's Shire Council, staunch opponents of the project, asked hypothetically if the government would allow this project to begin if it was proposing pumping 110,000 tonnes of CO² under the Great Barrier Reef?

Since then, the voice of opposition to this project has grown louder each month with several national organisations joining the call for more collaboration. Farmers for Climate Action, AgForce, Australian Lot feeders' Association, Queensland Farmers Federation and the National Farmers Federation and SWROC and NWROC have all called on the government for more consultation before going ahead. The Murweh Council says ultimately the government should work collaboratively with stakeholders to protect the Great Artesian Basin for regional communities.


LOUIS ARIO



Toddler Pool & Shade Structure:


