

By subscribing, you'll stay informed about important local updates and events. If you have any questions or need further assistance, feel free to ask!

Here are the steps to subscribe to the Opt-In Notifications for Murweh Shire Council.

1. Visit the Subscription Website: Head over to the Murweh Shire's official website where the subscription service is available. Or, use the QR Code on the right.

2. Enter Your Contact Information: Provide your email address and mobile phone number to receive notifications via SMS and/or email.

3. Select Your Preferences:

Choose the types of notifications you want to receive, such as disaster updates, community events, Council news or all three. The frequency of notifications can vary depending on the types of updates you choose to receive.

Disaster Updates: These are sent as needed, especially during emergencies or significant events.

Community Events:

Notifications are typically sent out a few times a month, depending on the number of events happening in the community.

Council News: These updates might be sent on a regular schedule, such as weekly or monthly, depending on the council's communication plan.

You can always adjust your preferences if you find you're receiving too many or too few notifications.

If you have any specific concerns or need more information, detailed the Murweh Shire Council's website should have more details.

I was born and raised in Charleville, making me a thirdgeneration resident. After completing my education, I worked for over 50 years in the Department of Justice and Attorney-General, retiring in 2023. During some of that time, I also worked as a part-time bookmaker, a role I plan to continue. I am married with two children, one of whom still lives in Charleville, and five grandchildren. I've been a lifetime member of the All Whites Rugby League Club (now defunct) and a former member of the Central Warrego Race Club. This is my fourth term as a Councillor and second term as Deputy Mayor. Following the March 2024 Council elections, Murweh Shire Council is entering a new term with a mix of experienced and new Councillors, led by Mayor Shaun (Zoro) Radnedge. We're fortunate to have CEO Bruce Scott, whose background as Mayor of Barcoo Shire is proving invaluable in guiding the future of our community.

Along with Bruce, our new Executive team includes Jacob Barton, Engineer, and Justin Kronk, Director of Corporate Services. I stay actively involved in both urban and rural areas, where our 2,600 km road network requires close attention. As a retiree, I'm looking forward to visiting towns like Augathella, Morven, and Cooladdi, and continuing to engage with elderly and vulnerable residents who are often overlooked.

I'm also hopeful that Murweh Shire's bid for a Country University Campus will be successful, offering local students more affordable study options close to home. Throughout my time as a Councillor,

l've worked closely with Indigenous communities and remain committed to fostering positive relationships and advocacy for their needs.

We're excited to continue serving the people of Murweh Shire and building a bright future together.



THE HUSBAND CAKE RECIPE

INGREDIENTS

- 3/4 cup shortening
- 11/2 cup sugar
- 1 can tomato soup
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 3 cup plain flour (all purpose)
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 3 teaspoon baking powder
- 11/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg

Grease and flour a 9 x 13 pan or 2 round cake pans. Cream shortening; add sugar; beat till light and fluffy. Add tomato soup mix well; add water-mix well.

I must admit when I poured the can of soup in I thought oh dear I've probably just wasted all this-I mean how will this ever taste good?

Sift dry ingredients together. Add to tomato mixture a little at a time and mix till smooth.

Spoon batter into greased and floured pan(s)-bake at 375 for 25-30 minutes depending on the pan size you use-and the way your oven cooks.

To make the frosting cream butter and cream cheese till blended; add vanilla and powdered sugar mix well.

When I made the cake I used 2 round 9 inch pans. I was so anxious to see how the cake tasted so I tried to remove one layer as soon as it came out of the oven, it came apart in pieces. The other layer I let cool a good 15-20 minutes and it came out perfectly.

THROUGH THE TELESCOPE

December promises a dazzling view here in Charleville, with a variety of celestial events to captivate stargazers.

The month kicks off with a new moon on the 1st, offering optimal conditions for observing faint celestial objects like Galaxies, Stars and their Clusters, even planets like Venus, Saturn Jupiter and even Mars!

On the 7th, Jupiter reaches its opposition, closest point to Earth, making it appear larger and brighter than usual. This ideal viewing window allows for detailed observation of its swirling cloud bands, its intriguing moons, and even the dynamic Great Red Spot, a colossal storm larger than Earth itself.

The Geminid meteor shower, renowned as one of the year's best, this peaks on the nights of the 13th and 14th, though the nearly full moon may dim some of the fainter meteors.

21st of December marks official summer the solstice for us in the southern hemisphere, even though it is already up to 30 degrees we will start to heat up more over the coming season. This also means it marks the winter solstice for the northern hemisphere, their temperatures will start to drop, and some locations will start to receive snow.

Another New Moon on the 30th provides another chance for dark sky.

With a combination of planetary alignments, meteor showers, and seasonal celestial events, December offers a delightful celestial experience for stargazers of all levels. Have a Merry Christmas, and happy new year from our team here at the Cosmos Centre, see you all next year.
